Snow Removal and Driveways

PennDOT recommends calling 511 or visiting. www.511PA.com. 511PA, is free and available 24 hours a day, it provides traffic delay warnings, weather forecasts, average traffic speeds and more. The department also asks motorists to allow plenty of space when driving near plow trucks. Also, for their own safety and the safety of plow operators, motorists should never attempt to pass a truck while it is plowing or spreading winter materials.

SWIFTREACH911

SwiftReach is a high-speed Emergency Notification System that alerts residents within seconds to emergency situations, weather advisories, public safety announcements, and more. Adams Township has incorporated the SwiftReach program within our community for residents and businesses to have access to. The program has the ability to deliver messages through landline phones, cell phones, emails, text messages and social media sites. Some highlights to this program are the ability to customize all your contact information, enter multiple addresses, even link family members to your account, and manage specific alerts you would like to receive. Residents can register via the Swift911 Web Portal on the homepage of the adamstwp.org website or download Application the Swift911 Public smartphones. Please note that there will be two Swift911 Applications shown; residents will need to choose the **Blue Public Application**.

WAR MEMORIAL "All gave some but some gave all"

JOHN CASHDOLLAR

Enlisted : August 23, 1862 as a Private , mustered into "D: Co, PA 137 Infantry

Parents: William Cashdollar and Margaret

Richardson. Occupation: Farmer

JAMES KIDD

Enlisted September 26, 1861 as a Private, mustered into "C" Co., PA 79th infantry. Killed October 8, 1862 in Perryville, Kentucky. Parents: Hugh Kidd & Margaret Spear, Brothers in Civil War: Hugh and Robert.

DAVID McCANDLESS

Enlisted August 17, 1861 as a Private, mustered into "C" Co., PA 46^{th} Infantry Killed May 2, 1862 in Chancellorsville, Va.

CPL JOSEPH FERENCE

7th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Cavalry Division, Army, Died: January 28, 1951. Was CPL – E4 MOS 4745 – Light Weapons Infantryman,

PVT HAROLD OTHELL FULLERTON

21st Infantry Regiment L Co. 24th Infantry Division Army- Died July 11, 1950 – PVT E-2 MOS 4745 – Light Weapons Infantryman- Location of Death: Chochwon

PFC RICHARD GERSTNER

 $7^{\rm th}$ Cavalry Regiment G Co., $1^{\rm st}$ Cavalry Division, Army, Died August $14^{\rm th}$ 1950 MOS 4745 -Light Weapons Infantry

PFC RICHARD ISOVITSCH

 35^{TH} Infantry, 25^{th} Infantry Division, Army Died: August 5, 1950, PFC – E3,

PFC. JAMES A GROVE, JR

23rd Infantry Regiment, 2nd Infantry Division, Army, Died: September 4, 1950, PFC E-3, MOS 4745 – Light Weapons Infantryman – Location of Death: Changnyong

MSG GEORGE RAYMON HOUSEKEEPER, JR.

31ST Infantry Regiment L Co., 7th Infantry Division – Army – Died while missing in action – Date of Loss: December 12, 1950, MSG – E8, MOS 1745 – Light Weapons Infantry Leader, Location of Loss: Hamhung

MSGT Housekeeper was a member of Company L,

3rd Battalion, 31st Infantry Regiment 7th Infantry Division, He was listed as missing in action while fighting the enemy at the Chosin Reservoir, North Korea on December 12, 1950. He was presumed dead on December 31, 1953.

BNC ROBERT AUGUSTUS BECK

USS Magpie (AMS-25) United States Navy Fleet, Died while missing: Date of Loss – October 1, 1950, BNC E-7

Chief Boatswain's Mate Beck served aboard the minesweeper, USS Magpie in Korean Waters. On October 1, 1950 it struck a floating mine and sunk. Twenty -one men were lost. He was listed as missing in action while engaged with the enemy. He was presumed dead on October 2, 1951

PFC RICHARD HENRY ELLENBERGER

1st Marine Regiment I Co. 3BN, 1st Marine Division, Marines, Died April 15, 1952, PFC- E2.



About our flag's colors

Always wondered what Old Glory's Red, White and Blue symbolized?

On July 4, 1776, the Continental Congress passed a resolution authorizing a committee to devise a seal for the United States of America. This mission, designed to reflect the Founding Fathers' beliefs, values, and sovereignty of the new Nation, did not become a reality until June 20, 1782. In heraldic devices, such as seals, each element has a specific meaning. Even colors have specific meanings. The colors red, white, and blue did not have meanings for The Stars and Stripes when it was adopted in 1777. However, the colors in the Great Seal did have specific meanings. Charles Thompson, Secretary of the Continental Congress, reporting to Congress on the Seal, stated:

"The colors of the pales (the vertical stripes) are those used in the flag of the United States of America; White signifies purity and innocence, Red, hardiness & valour, and Blue, the color of the Chief (the broad band above the stripes) signifies vigilance, perseverance & justice."

"The star is a symbol of the heavens and the divine goal to which man has aspired from time immemorial; the stripe is symbolic of the rays of light" emanating from the sun."

Living the "Pittsburgh Strong" Mission in Mars: The Rachel's Challenge Community Presentation

This fall our own community has been impacted by violence with the bomb threats at the Mars Area High School and the hate based massacre at The Tree of Life Synagogue in Squirrel Hill. "Pittsburgh Strong" has been a popular moto in our area, but how do we practically implement that moto in our community in a meaningful way? What can we do as a community to help reduce bullying, violence and hate, building a stronger, kinder, more respectful and more connected community?

Rachel's Challenge is a worldwide non-profit organization reaching more than 25 million people, that focuses on promoting kindness, compassion, tolerance and reaching out to those in need by sharing the story of Rachel Joy Scott. Rachel was the first student killed in the Columbine High School shooting in 1999. Her death was just the start of her story however. Following her death, her journals and outpouring of stories from other students revealed how Rachel impacted others with her vision for a kinder, more connected world. She wrote "I want to reach out to those with special needs because they are often overlooked. I want to reach out to those who are new in school because they don't have any friends yet. And I want to reach out to those who are picked on or put down by others." Rachel didn't just write about it, she lived it.

The Rachel's Challenge Program positive outcomes include decreases in bullying, disciplinary referrals, suicides and drug use. Over 100 suicides are prevented each year following the showing of this program and multiple school shootings have been prevented because of the program. This program was implemented in the Mars Area School District in the fall of 2018 and there has been an incredibly positive response by school staff and students alike. However, the Rachel's Challenge Program is most impactful when the whole community becomes involved and all members of the community embrace these values. This is truly a life changing presentation appropriate for all adults in the community to attend!

Residents Reminded to Call 911

Residents are reminded that ALL calls for police services must go through Butler County 911 system. This includes all calls regardless of whether or not the issue is a true emergency. We understand that callers can be initially uncomfortable calling 911 for what they feel is a non-emergency, but the Butler County 911 system tracks all calls and dispatches the necessary law enforcement and/or emergency personnel. The Adams Township Police ask that residents refrain from contacting the Police Department's general telephone number with any issues requesting a police response.

Calls to the Police Department can go unanswered especially in the evening and weekend hours. If a resident needs to speak with an Officer regarding a non-emergency issue, they can contact the Butler County 911 system through the non-emergency phone number 724- 287-7769 or 911. If you need to speak with a particular Officer, you may call the Police Department and choose the appropriate extension. Thank you for your cooperation.
